#### Saint Therese Center HIV Outreach

In the year 2013, the Saint Therese Center HIV Outreach will celebrate 15 years of service to the Southern Nevada community. It seems like only vesterday we opened and our first client, a HIV+ dad with four children showed up at our door. That Christmas, we helped that one family with food and Christmas gifts. This past Christmas season, we helped over 486 families. The food distributed, for just the Christmas season, totaled over \$73,578.00, while the toys donated and distributed came to \$10,865.11. Including Laughlin (see back page), the grand total for Christmas alone was over \$88,769.85! We have come a long way throughout the years. I sometimes look back and think, "How did we become what we are and do what we're doing?" I wonder, "What is still to come?" and "Will people continue to be generous, kind, giving and loving towards the Saint Therese Center HIV Outreach?" I often think, "Am I crazy in doing this ministry?" At

times I ask individuals, "Would you like my job?" Responses usually include hysterical laughter and a resounding "NO!" # **CDSMP**, Saint Therese HIV Education, Dignity Health

This past summer, Father Joseph, O.P. and his assistant David, who is an HIV positive individual, completed training at Stanford University to be Master Trainers (ability to train others to be leaders) in the Chronic Disease Self-Management Program (CDSMP). The CDSMP is a workshop given two and a half hours each week, for six weeks. Subjects covered include: 1) techniques to deal with problems such as frustration, fa-

tigue, pain and isolation; 2) appropriate exercise for maintaining and improving strength, flexibility and endurance; 3) appropriate use of medications; 4) communicating effectively with family, friends and health care professionals; 5) nutrition and 6) how to evaluate new treatments. There is also great emphasis on three process skills, action planning, disease related problem-solving and decision making. Both David and Father

Joseph have completed two CDSMP workshops with clients and thus now are certified instructors by Stanford University. This enables them to cross over into an HIV wellness program and allows them to offer a seven week workshop for HIV+ people to learn how to live well with the HIV virus in their lives. All this training and materials for workshops are made possible from a grant distributed by St. Rose Dominican Hospitals,

Dignity Health. The workshops are available to our clients and anyone in the community. Call for information, (702) 564-4224.

## **United Way and Support**

United Way of Southern Nevada (UWSN) provides a link for individuals, families, teams and corporate groups to join together and engage in meaningful volunteer opportunities throughout southern Nevada. United Way strives to promote volunteerism and get people involved in their communities. They do this in partnership with other organizations, so they are working together to bring long-lasting change in our communities. The Saint Therese Center HIV Out-

reach and United Way have worked over the past three years on the annual Mail Carriers Letter Association Postal Food Drive. More recently we have partnered together with them in accomplishing projects at the Saint Therese Center HIV Outreach using various volunteers. The workers from Aggregate Industries came out in early November and volunteered two days of work on the Executive Office Campus (see photo on left). In January, Ipsen Corporate Service

came to the Executive Offices and unloaded, sorted and crated three trucks of canned food and Ocean Spray juices. In February, they also arranged for Roark Capital and MGM Convention Center to provide more than 200 volunteers to put together 1,000 hygiene bags and 1,000 food boxes for our clients. In addition to products, Roark Capital donated \$14,000.00 to cover food and hygiene items cost! Saint Therese Center HIV Outreach is happy to be part of United Way's program activities!

# **Basic High School Special Education Classes**

Basic High School at 400 Palo Verde is just down the street from the Saint Therese Center HIV Outreach Executive Offices at 215 Palo Verde. School Administration contacted Father Joseph, O.P. regarding their special Education Class coming to the Center each week and volunteering. They do repetitive work and actions, thereby helping them learn skills that could be put to use in their future as they become active working members in the community. On Tuesday mornings, the younger Special

Education class comes for two hours. On Thursday mornings, the older Special Education class comes for 11/2 hours. The work they do to help the Saint Therese Center HIV Outreach is in labeling plastic bags and filling them with sugar, flour, beans, or soap from 50 pound sacks. They load and unload food on trucks for the pantries at Main and San Martin campuses. The staff is most grateful for their hard work, as they save us a lot of work! We are proud to be part of Basic High School's Special Education class. They remind all of us that "People are made to succeed, NOT to fail!" (student manual).

## **New Refrigerator Trucks**

The Engelstad Family Foundation gave the Saint Therese Center HIV Outreach a grant to purchase a larger refrigerated truck for fresh rescue as well as major donations of cold and frozen foods. After researching and working with a couple of dealers, Father Joseph decided on going with TEC of Las Vegas. There will be a new (2013) 26-foot long HINO refrigerated truck purchased as well as a used (2007) 24-foot long HINO refrigerated truck as the grant monies covers the expense. At

the same time, two of our existing vehicles will be retired and their good parts kept to have a third vehicle of its kind in great working order. This is a side of the Saint Therese Center HIV Outreach that is not pretty or a fun side, but it is an absolute necessity. We must have the equipment (and in good working order) to have food on the shelves in the pantries and items picked up when necessary. These vehicles will help in many ways, including great billboard advertising for the Center's outreach

once the trucks have the lettering placed on them. It is hoped that we will have roses and rose petals flowing down the sides of these trucks demonstrating Saint Therese's shower of roses. Therese promised to do good on earth while she is in Heaven, allowing her shower of roses to fall on the earth where needed. The Saint Therese Center HIV Outreach is a visible place where those roses fall and now our trucks say it! Look for us on the road as you drive in town!

Trang
HIV+ since 2009



"Hi everybody! My name is Trang. I'm Vietnamese. I have immigrated in the US for only 10 months. I was a teacher of High School in Vietnam. I had a beautiful family with 2 daughters. I love them very much. But after I met a lot of troubles in my life. In the year 2000 I had M.D. It made me lose my job and my husband. I felt very miserable and bored. I couldn't take care of myself and my children, so I decided to immigrate in the U.S., to live with my mom and my sisters family. Before immigrating, my doctor said I had trouble with my blood test, I had HIV from my husband.

Oh, I cried a lot, I was so disappointed, I didn't want to live anymore. But my friends, my students and my family advised and encouraged me to be brave to overcome everything and to live because of my lovely daughters. They are still young. And I tried my best to overcome my diseases. In 2010, I was immigrated in the U.S. When I lived here, I also met a lot of difficulties because I am a single Mom and a handicapped woman. I have no money, no job, no insurance and no house. I still try to live and to do exercise everyday to cure my M.D. Four months ago, the doctor told me I had Cancer. Oh I don't know how I felt and I just smiled at myself.

One day, AFAN introduced me to the Saint Therese Center HIV Outreach. So I am supported food and food vouchers every month to help my family. I am very happy this month, I had a chance to join the Retreat of Saint Therese Center HIV Outreach for three days. They are wonderful days in my life, I got a lot of loving, caring and sharing of Father, Brother, Toni, Nikita, Edwina and everyone. It made me more confident to face my diseases, and I enjoy helping and sharing with everyone.

I will try my best to overcome everything. I will always smile! Thank you Father Joseph and everyone! I love you.©"

# Norman HIV+ since 1996



"My story starts back in 1995 in Hawaii. I was married with five children, had a great job, and even started my own business. Times were great. Then one day in 1996, my doctor said that he had some bad news. I had contracted the HIV virus. I was shocked. I did not know what to say. I knew that my children had to get tested and I was so scared. Thank the Lord, all their results were negative. Shortly after, my marriage fell apart and I lost my business and my job. To get away, I moved to Las Vegas to get my head on straight, but I started to do drugs, drink a lot, I was under a lot of stress, depressed and thought often about suicide. Then one day, I heard a voice that told me you have to take care of your children. It took a good year or so for me to accept the fact I was HIV+ and I realized that I had to think of my responsibilities as a dad.

I got a great job here, all the while keeping my HIV status a secret. Ultimately, I wound up getting all my kids here with me and was taking care of them, as well as myself. Boy, was this hard on me (five teenagers are a handful, to say the least).

The stress of everything on my shoulders was almost too much to bear. I got so sick that I lost my job and had to cash out my little bit of retirement that I had managed to save, just to feed us and keep a roof over our heads, but I did what I had to do. One day while at my doctor's office, I heard someone talking about the "Saint Therese Center HIV Outreach" and was encouraged to go down there and they would help me. I still had some pride, but I had to think of my children. We were all hungry, so I went. What a wonderful place it is. Since I wasn't working and I had some legal matters to take care of, I asked if I could do my community service there and Father Joseph said yes.

The Saint Therese Center saved my life and kept me from going off the deep end. Thank you Father Joseph for caring for me and helping me take care of my family. All of my kids ultimately wanted to go back to Hawaii, so one by one I sent them back when they were ready. I am still a volunteer at the Saint Therese Center and continue to try and always do the right thing. Today I am happy and blessed beyond words. Thank you Saint Therese Center for making my life what it is today."
